The Picts populated a large part of Scotland in the Iron Age and Early Medieval Period. We do not have sufficient survivals to reconstruct their language, and they left few historical records, but we have been able to recover information about them from art and archaeology. In this webinar, we will explore popular culture references to the Picts, including anachronistic appearances in a wide range of movies, television series, and books by authors such as Kipling and Pratchett - and compare these representations to the historical Picts.

This webinar will take a visual tour of the sites, and explore the new light they have shed on our understanding of early medieval Gaelic churches.
